LOWER SCHOOL: THE FOUNDATIONAL YFARS

In our Lower School the emphasis is on

building the foundations that will support students' academic, social, and spiritual growth throughout their education. Through our rebranding process, completed last January, the following pillars were identified as highlights and unique qualities of our program in grades 1-4:

- Coming to know the reality of God's loving presence in our world
- Using technology to become a productive digital citizen
- Learning world languages to foster language skills and the awareness of different cultures
- Immersion in art, music, and drama to connect ideas across other subjects
- Discovering the rewards of sportsmanship, fair play, and helping others

"Our Lower School also develops a strong foundation for our students' social and emotional development by teaching them how to work and learn together through collaborative groups," said Tom Lengel P'12, Head of School. "You can't walk down the hall in Lower School without seeing students working together in literature circles and math groups. Learning to develop the social and emotional maturity to work successfully in groups will be key to their academic and professional success throughout their lives."

By the time our students reach fourth grade at Holy Child School at Rosemont, they have grown and matured through the rich educational, spiritual, and social foundation gained through their Lower School experience. They take a leadership role in the Lower School, setting examples for the younger children and leading prayer services and assemblies. At the end of fourth grade, they are ready to move on to Middle School as more independent, confident learners who are dedicated to becoming responsible, productive world citizens.



COMING TO KNOW THE REALITY OF GOD'S LOVING PRESENCE IN OUR WORLD

Throughout their Lower School journey, our students are coming to know the loving presence of God in their world. Their religious journey teaches our children to respect others and the church, as well as how to be a member of a community. In addition, as a multicultural Holy Child community and world, we teach our children about other religions and their beliefs.

"Our Lower School teachers are very committed to living out the Holy Child



goals and introducing our children to the idea of being part of God's family, their own family, and the School community," said Director of Lower School Jeanne Marie Blair P'96'99'04. "Their experience includes daily morning prayer, Bible stories in first grade, the sacraments of First Penance and First Holy Communion in second grade, learning about gratitude and giving thanks in third grade; and ending their Lower School experience in fourth grade by leading a prayer service that takes them and their parents on the journey of the Jesse Tree."

In the Lower School, our students have learned to live their religion and understand that religion is not just attendance at a prayer service, or participating in a sacrament. Instead, we teach by example and encourage our students to have religion as an everyday part of their life.

USING TECHNOLOGY TO BECOME A PRODUCTIVE DIGITAL CITIZEN

Students in grades one through four advance their technology skills and learn to become responsible digital citizens as part of the Lower School's 21st century curriculum. This includes teaching students to create a positive digital footprint, beginning as early as first grade.

"In first grade students begin to blog; it is a really big deal for them. In an age appropriate way, our first grade teachers show students how to utilize technology to communicate. The students are taught to only post their best work in a way that is a positive experience for them as writers



and their readers," explained Jeanne Marie. "So as the students grow and navigate their way through the digital world, they have a strong foundation with this positive online experience."

Students develop their digital skills throughout their entire Lower School experience. They learn how to use email appropriately and safely, learn to perform online research, participate in a digital citizen unit, and learn to collaborate on projects utilizing online tools such as Google Docs. Furthermore, our Lower School students learn to use technology to communicate and collaborate with their peers across the country and around the world. For example, this year, our students had the opportunity to communicate online through Skype with classrooms in Peru and in Canada.

By the time our Lower School students are ready to enter Middle School, they are able to see the bigger picture on both the benefits and potential pitfalls associated with technology. So when our fifth grade students receive their Chromebooks and are introduced to our Middle School Responsible Use Policy for Technology, most of these guidelines are second nature for them.

LEARNING WORLD LANGUAGES TO FOSTER LANGUAGE SKILLS AND THE AWARENESS OF DIFFERENT CULTURES

Learning world languages helps to foster our young students' awareness of different cultures. This is just one of the reasons why we introduced Spanish in PreKindergarten several years ago, and why our students continue their Spanish studies throughout their entire time at Holy Child.

"What has been really unique is that not only are the children learning the basics of Spanish in first through fourth grade, Señora Estevez has elevated our program by integrating Spanish and its cultural traditions throughout the Lower School," explained Jeanne Marie. "Spanish language and culture have been integrated by teaching Spanish songs in music; praying the Hail Mary and Our Father; celebrating the Day of the Dead and Cinco de Mayo; and participating in Flamenco and Rhumba dancing."

This has directly contributed to our students' fluency and comprehension, resulting in our students consistently scoring higher than the national average in the National Spanish Exam for the seven years the School has participated. This includes Jonathan Carroll '16, who last year became the second student in Holy Child history to achieve a perfect score on the test.





IMMERSION IN ART, MUSIC, AND DRAMA TO CONNECT **IDEAS ACROSS** OTHER SUBJECTS

At Holy Child, music, art, and drama are integral to a 21st century education in our Lower School. While many other schools have limited or eliminated teaching the arts, our students in Lower School have music and art instruction two times a week.

"Cornelia Connelly, the Foundress of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, was a firm believer and an ardent advocate of the importance of the arts, drama, the

DISCOVERING THE REWARDS OF SPORTSMANSHIP, FAIR PLAY, AND HELPING OTHERS

Some of the most important lessons learned and foundations built in Lower School take place not just in our formal academic setting but also in the gym, on the playground, and on the athletic fields.

"The Lower School Physical Education program provides a safe arena for children to explore, take risks, and form relationships through play. The experience of developing characteristics such as trust, respect, teamwork, and honesty enables all lower school children to be empathetic, resilient, and confident," explained Director of Athletics Maribeth McCallion P'07'09. "Sportsmanship is learned in class by understanding how another feels through empathy and how to try again through resilience. Confidence blooms when children take a journey in age appropriate

ways and learn to improve, see that improvement, and build themselves into the children we want to see each day. As adults we need to challenge children to take this journey themselves and to be good citizens, friends, and opponents through the art of play."

As important as learning sportsmanship and fair play is the Lower School's emphasis on giving back to the community. Every student is involved in a variety of community service projects where they learn the importance of being good citizens.

"We work very hard to teach our children the difficult concept of giving back to their community without expecting something in return." said Jeanne Marie. "For example, we make pies with Lower School children for the Divine Mercy Pantry. Each year children will ask 'Can we have one?' This is a wonderful teachable moment where we explain that making the pies is something that we are doing for others (with no expectation of something in return) who may never have an opportunity to have a special treat."

In addition to the pies, here are a few more examples of how our Lower School community helped others.

- Ice cream sundae sale that raised \$460, last year, for Philabundance
- Canned goods drive that collected almost 1,200 cans for the Patrician Society

visual arts, and surrounding children with beauty," said Tom. "So that is something that is near and dear to us here at Holy Child School at Rosemont. These are subjects that are important for all children in their overall development, especially for some children where they can really shine. When they are taught well, music and art are every bit as academic as a math or an English class can be."

Students have the opportunity to take violin lessons in third grade and participate in extra-curricular music activities such as Lower School Choir and Beginning Band. In art class, students learn about the elements and principles of art and design while often working on interdisciplinary projects

connected with students' core subjects. Third grade students this year worked on an interdisciplinary study on penguins.

"The Emperor Penguin project was collaborative and multifaceted. It related to the Lower School's summer reading of *Mr. Popper's Penguins*, as well as to science, math, and the elements and principles of art," explained Tina Riviello P'20, Art Teacher for grades K-5. "The mathematical component required the students to scale up from a one-inch square of a gridded photograph to a five-inch square that they drew with oil pastel. Then the children combined their individual squares to complete the full image. The images of the penguins are approximately the actual

height of an Emperor Penguin. When they finished, they worked collaboratively again to make a video about how and why they made the project." (See photo on page 6.)

To celebrate the creative talents of our students, an Arts Festival is held every spring at Holy Child where the work of every student is featured. *

Holy Child School at Rosemont, athletics aren't just an extracurricular activity; they play a key role in their overall School experience and their personal development during their Middle School years. Through the School's holistic, inclusive program and supportive coaches, the almost 90 percent of Middle School students who participate in the School's sports teams develop not only athletic skills and habits that instill the foundation for a healthy lifestyle, but experience personal growth in life skills such as sportsmanship, teamwork, persistence, and resilience that will serve them well throughout the rest of their lives.

Our School's emphasis on personal growth through athletics reflects the Holy the personal growth and development of all who participate in the life of the School. Steve Clarke '73 P'01'03, who has been teaching and coaching football at Holy Child for 38 years, firmly believes that developing those important life skills is the key focus of our sports program.

"At Holy Child, we have always been concerned with developing better athletes and to a certain extent winning, but that's never, ever been the main focus," said Steve. "The main focus has always been about challenging yourself personally, improving yourself as a human being, improving the team as opposed to worrying about what is best for you. It's always been about us teaching the kids that you need to set aside what your personal goals might be if they conflict with the goals of the team. It's all about the team and being

willing to sacrifice for the greater good. I've always coached that way, and I know Dan Algeo (former teacher) coached that way, and I see our coaches today still coaching that way. It can be tough to do in a world that is much more interested in scholarships, winning games, and championships. But anybody who really knows these sports will tell you that when the focus is on those things, then you don't have a good program."

Holy Child offers varsity and junior varsity teams in basketball, field hockey, football, swimming, and track and field. Our boys' and girls' varsity and junior varsity basketball, football and field hockey teams compete in the Catholic Athletic League (CAL) where they have had great success with a total of 37 championships over the last ten years, including our current JV boys' football team who were CAL Co-Champions in 2016.

Contributing to our athletes' success is the early start they receive in developing their skills in 4th grade, when girls at Holy Child have the opportunity to learn skills on our developmental field hockey team and boys participate in JV football. Holy Child athletes also have the benefit of extra practice time in their Middle School years. While other schools may only allot 45 to 90 minutes of practice two to three days a week for their Middle School students, our athletes practice three to four days a week for two hours.

As our athletes progress through Middle School, they learn how to manage their time and balance athletics with


school work, to be responsible by coming prepared to practices and games, to communicate schedule changes to their coaches, and to look out for one another as teammates.

"We try to ask the students to manage their own journey through respect, perseverance, and stick-to-it-tiveness. And I think because of all of those hidden curriculum essentials the children learn here, they bloom in high school because they are so well-prepared in all those areas. So, in high school they can put all their energies into skill development," said Director of Athletics Maribeth McCallion P'07'09.

A key foundation of Holy Child's sports program is our "no-cut policy," which ensures students can play the sport of their choice,

regardless of experience or athletic ability. Holy Child is one of the only independent schools in the area to have a no-cut policy. Maribeth feels that the no-cut policy and the team structure play an important role in each athlete's development at Holy Child.


"We may not win all the time, but we sure do a great job with the talent we have, while playing everybody because of our no-cut policy. And I do feel every child is valued, and even the strongest

player has empathy for the weakest player, and the weakest player wants to work as hard as the best player. I think that those aspects of how we teach and how our ethics are run here guide them in high school," explained Maribeth. "Every child does feel that they have a role here on whatever team they are on, and that they are valued and respected—not only by the coaches/teachers, but by their peers. Playing 7th and 8th grade on one team and 5th and 6th on another works like a classroom within itself. When practicing together, the younger athletes learn from the 7th and 8th graders. And for the 7th and 8th graders, it offers opportunities to develop compassion and leadership skills as they train, mentor, and provide sportsmanship towards the younger students.

That model itself is invaluable to the overall excellence of what we teach here at Holy Child and to building a community across grades."

Because all of our students have the opportunity to play sports while they are young, they learn how to exercise and train and to develop healthy habits and a passion for exercise that supports a healthy lifestyle throughout their lives.

"What's important to me is when they come back 20 years from now and they tell me that they're running this or running that, exercising in that way," said Steve. "That's when I'll know whether what we did here was successful. We want to create life-long athletes, or more appropriately, lifelong exercisers. It's important to all of us as coaches."

More immediately, Steve feels that the no-cut policy ensures that students who may develop physically and athletically later than their peers still have the opportunity to build their skills and learn valuable life lessons early in their school years and possibly


go on to athletic success in high school and college when their bodies are further developed.

"These are grade-school kids, so we will have students who really are not very good athletes, even up until the time they graduate here, but who will become very good high school and college athletes," said Steve. "There's the aspect of you don't want to cheat a kid out of something that he or she might develop into later in life and there's the aspect of it's not all about winning and losing the games. It's about groups learning to play together and making the sacrifices that are necessary. And that might mean giving up some of your playing time for a kid that maybe isn't as good as you are. But it has to be seen as a whole educational experience. Sports aren't separate from the classroom; it's all part of the same thing."

Maribeth agreed, citing that many of our athletes go on to play sports in high school that are different from those they played at Holy Child. A student that played

football at Holy Child may not grow to the size required for high school or college football, but the leadership and teamwork skills, along with the capacity for hard work and perseverance that they developed at

participating in a different sport in high school.



"The boys were well coached at Holy Child and learned the foundations discipline, hard work, preparation, and teamwork. Because these key tenets were established early, the boys found it easy to adapt to a highly competitive sports program at St.



Joe's Prep," said Steve Schreder. "Two very important attributes our boys were able to develop by competing at Holy Child and in the Catholic Academy League were confidence and leadership. They had opportunities to start and to lead teams at an early age, which may not have been the case if they had attended larger institutions. This was particularly evident in the 6th and 8th grade years when the kids are really given the responsibility of running/leading the JV and varsity teams, respectively. We saw a real transformation in both boys during this period and a level of maturity that was beyond their years."

Director of Early Childhood Rita Smith P'06'08 saw a similar transformation in her son, Joe '08 as he developed as an athlete at Holy Child and later went on to play baseball, basketball, and football for Malvern Preparatory School.

"Joe gained the confidence and poise to play a sport," Rita said. "Whether on the court or the field he knew what he was supposed to do and was able to see the whole picture. He learned to be part of a team and support his teammates. Sports at Holy Child allowed Joe a place to shine. The coaches recognized and nurtured his talents."

For Holy Child alumna Olivia Traynor '14, the teamwork and social aspects of being an athlete remain central to her enjoyment of playing golf at Academy of Notre Dame de Namur, despite that golf is viewed as an individual sport.

"Her interest in sports and playing on teams started at Holy Child. She loves the social aspects of being on a team. It's a big part of her extracurricular activities—practicing, playing, cheering on other teams. All of it. Sports have become an all-round passion," said Olivia's mother, Kristen Traynor P'14'17'22. "She enjoys building relationships with teammates and that's something she realized in Middle School, and it's continued in high school. Relationship-building becomes even more apparent to her because golf is usually more of an individual sport, but in high school she plays for a team, and the team element of it is the part she loves best. She seems to play her best golf when she's playing for a team or with a partner, and we don't see the same excitement when it's just her in a tournament."

One thing is clear, when Holy Child alumni athletes return to visit the School, they bring with them many joyous memories of games played and friendships made, along with a recognition of the value of the personal growth they achieved by playing sports at Holy Child.

"If you were to attend an alumni function, most of them want to come back and see the coaches," said Maribeth. "The greatest thing about that is they don't remember the wins and losses; they remember the experiences and the moments. They remember being challenged and respected. And I think that is what makes Holy Child student athletes so valuable and wanted by our area high schools. They want our students because they are well-rounded, strong, competent, creative, smart young people. And it will make their community better to have a Holy Child student."

WHY WE ARE A HOLY CHILD FAMILY

For Cinde Hark P'18'21'24, finding Holy Child

For Alexis, her Lower School colleague community serves as a great support system and an inspiration for what she does on a daily basis. "It helps spark ideas in me and it helps us to push each other to be good teachers." She especially treasures her collaborative relationship with grade partner, Lynn Gosnell P'00'02'05'06. "We are truly partners. We work together on our curriculum to make it meaningful and challenging for each group that comes through. She has taught me so many techniques and creative ways to meet the students' needs. We bring out the best in one another."

One of Alexis' emphases in first grade is integrating technology with traditional practices of reading and writing. The students work on individual blogs that result in a digital portfolio. Throughout the process, they learn computer skills such as cutting, pasting, saving, and typing. Alexis also utilizes computer applications for reading fluency, assessment, and collaborative learning.

At the end of the day, teaching first graders and helping them transition from Early Childhood is a difficult job, but it is a rewarding endeavor. "I love that each day is never the same and that I get hugs daily from toothless kids," said Alexis. "It's a joyful job to come to." •

TRANSPLANT ADMINISTRATOR, PENN TRANSPLANT INSTITUTE. UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA HEALTH SYSTEM



PHILADELPHIA, PA

When you hear news stories about successful

outcomes for organ transplant patients, you've probably never thought of the tremendous coordination of people and processes that were required to achieve those happy endings. For the last 20 years, Diane Schwegman Jakobowski '66 P'93'95'98'06 has managed that process as the Transplant Administrator for the nearly 500 organ transplants performed each year at the Penn Transplant Institute, University of Pennsylvania Health System.



"It's a very intense, busy program, and we're just doing great work," said Diane. "It's a really rewarding career to see these patients recover and go home to their families. When it comes to being an administrator, I like to take a process from the beginning and see it to the end—to work with the staff and the people here, to have something come to fruition and move it through the process and ensure good outcomes."

The transplant process works through an organ procurement agency that is set up on a national level through the United States Department of Health and Human Services; this ensures that organs are distributed in an equitable way. Diane manages the process for Penn and oversees the 110 employees who handle every phase of the process from the first referral through the post-transplant phase of care.

In the best case scenario, a patient's case goes before a multidisciplinary team, which determines if the patient should receive a transplant. This process can take anywhere from a week to a couple of months. There are exceptions for critical emergency patients who are flown in by helicopter a few hours before they receive a transplant.

"With some patients, we don't hear about them soon enough and it can be a very, very fast pace," explained Diane. "It's like an orchestrated dance. Everybody has a job and everybody just gets it done. No day is the same for any of our staff!"

Looking back on her time as a student, Diane feels that the emotional support she received at Holy Child had an impact on her career path and contributed to her current success.

"I think self-confidence was the biggest thing that I gained at Holy Child," said Diane. "Self-confidence and thinking about what you are doing right and not focusing on what isn't going right. I learned that as long as you did your best, you would succeed. I went on to college and graduate school and a career in healthcare. I think if I hadn't had a positive feeling about my ability to do that, that if I had been in a different school, maybe that wouldn't have happened."

I loved my years at Holy Child

and that is the reason why we sent our children there. **

Diane felt she received a strong academic foundation at Holy Child that prepared her for high school and beyond. That foundation and the values she received here were key reasons why she chose to send her four children to Holy Child.

"I loved my years at Holy Child and that is the reason why we sent our children there. My perspective was that the character building, the personal development, and the academics were so strong at Holy Child, as well as the desire to help the community, and the Catholic education. I wanted them to have the kind of upbringing that would make them good citizens of the world. And they've all become that. So I'm very pleased with their education.".

JOSEPH MCGEEHIN '98

WHITE HOUSE FELLOW



As a White House Fellow you were placed in the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR). What can you share about the work you do?



To provide some background: the Fellowship was created by President Johnson in 1964 on the premise that "a genuinely free society cannot be a spectator society." It provides firsthand experience in the process of governing to a small group from a variety of backgrounds (16 in our case) with the goals of promoting service and developing public leadership.

I feel extraordinarily

fortunate to be a part of the program and to be placed at USTR. My work focuses on our domestic and international economic engagement, from relationship-building with foreign governments to negotiation and enforcement of other countries' obligations to us under various agreements. Given the attention trade has received by both the outgoing and incoming administrations, there has been no shortage of work or learning!

How did you come to be a White House Fellow?

I had known about the program since college and had always hoped to apply. The process was intense; it began with a written application that required significant thought about what I hope to accomplish in life and why I considered the Fellowship a necessary part of that development. From the written submissions, approximately 100 people advanced to 8 regional panels, where we underwent a day and a half of evaluation. Thirty people then proceeded to the national Selection Weekend, which is held in Washington, DC with the President's Commission on White House Fellows, a group of appointees charged with interviewing and selecting each class. After two and a half days with the Commission, 16 of us were selected for this year's class. I began drafting my application in September 2015 and learned of my appointment in June 2016 (special thanks to my wife, Lauren, for being my editor- and interviewer-in-chief).

What do you remember most about your years here at Holy Child?

WASHINGTON, DC

The two things I remember most about Holy Child are the people and community. Some of the most formative relationships I've had with teachers were at Holy Child: Mrs. Cassidy in second grade, Mr. Algeo in eighth, and Mrs. McCloskey in math. They pushed me to think critically, to ask questions, and taught me that learning would be a lifelong process. All of this was complemented by a community that encouraged students to be respectful and appreciative of each other.

What is your favorite Holy Child memory?

I ran for a touchdown against Waldron Mercy in eighth grade; my brothers say the time had to be measured in days rather than seconds. Aside from that, my favorite memories are Mrs. McReynolds regularly putting aside a stack of books for me to take home from the library. I'm in her debt for making me such a reader.

**Holy Child taught me to think, to write, and to have confidence

that my opinion mattered.

What did you learn at Holy Child that contributed to your professional success?

Appreciating that learning is a lifelong process has been quite helpful along the way because it's made me more intellectually curious than the alternative. To the extent that's not developed early I think it can be difficult to do later in life. I also return frequently to the motto of "Actions Not Words," which is how I pattern my leadership style. •
